

## Private Mark Graham killed tragically in 'preventable' friendly fire incident

The Hamilton native and former Olympian was killed in Afghanistan, Sept. 4, 2006.

Private Mark Anthony Graham of Hamilton, a former Olympic athlete from the west Mountain, was killed in a friendly fire attack in Afghanistan on Sept. 4, 2006.

Graham and his company were making breakfast and packing up their gear before heading back into a battle zone in the Panjwaii district when two U.S.A.-10 Thunderbolts strafed the Canadian troops. In addition to Graham's death, 30 other Canadians were wounded, five seriously.

A report from Canada's Department of National Defence said the Americans "mistook a garbage fire at the Canadian location for his target without verifying the target through his targeting pod and heads-up display."

"The incident was preventable," the report concluded.

The 33-year-old of the Royal Canadian Regiment was the first Hamilton native to die in the war against Taliban insurgents. His death brought the number of Canadians killed in Panjwaii fighting to five.

The five deaths were the most suffered by Canada in a 24-hour period since Canadian troops first arrived in Afghanistan in early 2002. Graham attended Sir Allan MacNab Secondary School where he distinguished himself in track and field.

A memorial track and field meet is held in Graham's honour every year, and Olympic Park was renamed in his honour.
